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1. General Information

1.1 Germany in General

The Federal Republic of Germany is situated in the centre of Europe. 82 million people live here, of whom 8.2 million are foreigners. Nearly half of the German people live in the 85 towns with a population of more than 100,000. A lively, multinational scene thrives in the population centres.

Germany has nine neighbours: Denmark to the north, the Netherlands and Belgium to the north-west, France and Luxembourg to the west, Austria and Switzerland to the south, the Czech Republic and Poland to the east.

Although regional dialects differ widely from each other, the nation is united by its common language: "High German".

The German landscape is as varied as its dialects. In the north, chains of islands can be found with extensive sand dunes and marshlands. Dense mixed forests and medieval castles line the river valleys and mountains in central Germany, once praised by the German Romantic poets. Even the industrial landscape of the Ruhr area is dotted with open green spaces. The Alps with their crystal clear mountain lakes rise majestically in the south.

The Federal Republic of Germany has been a parliamentary democracy since the Basic Law (Grundgesetz - the German constitution) was passed in 1949. Under the Basic Law, everyone is guaranteed fundamental rights, such as freedom of belief, free speech and equality before the law. Berlin is the German capital, which is the seat of government and where the ministries are located.

The backbone of the German economy is its car manufacturing, electronics and pharmaceutical industries. Noteworthy is the applied concept of Germany's social market economy. It provides the citizens with public health insurance, pensions and a security net in case of injuries and accidents.

1.2 Understanding German(y)

You may wonder for instance, whether your German will be good enough to get by. You will find that most Germans are very helpful. Most have at least some knowledge of English, since it is taught in all schools. Some do also speak French.

In case you talk to Germans who have absolutely no knowledge of any foreign language, they will at least speak very slowly and in simple sentences to give you a chance to understand them.

1.3 Public holidays

Germany is said to be the country with the most public holidays. On these days **shops are usually closed** and of course there are no lectures.

Sometimes there are so-called bridge days if the holiday is close to a weekend. Yet some holidays are only regional holidays.

1.4 Opening Hours

In general, shops in Germany have different opening hours, depending on their size.

Smaller shops are mostly opened from 9am to 6pm during the week and on Saturdays.

Bigger shops and food discounters (such as *Lidl* and *Aldi*) are open from 7 or 8am to 9pm from Monday to Saturday. Because the law concerning the opening hours has recently been loosened, more and more big *shops* and *discounters* such as *Kaufland* and *Rewe* open their shops until 10pm. Shops are **not** open on Sundays, but in case of urgency you can buy some basic stuff at the *gas stations*.

Bars and restaurants usually close at 12pm during the week and at 2am in the weekends.

If you urgently need something from a **pharmacy** after regular opening hours or on Sundays/Bank Holidays, there is always an emergency service. You can look up which pharmacy is responsible:

Please consider that there may be an additional fee to pay for purchases during the emergency service hours.

1.5 Healthcare system

If your home country has a Social Security Treaty with Germany which includes an insurance clause, your present insurance is enough. You have to present the proof of insurance to the local AOK insurance. EU students are asked to bring the EHIC. The AOK will then free you from paying insurance and enable you to visit German doctors.

Students from non-EU countries are required to provide their own health insurance (insurance policy must carry “**unlimited coverage**”) or have the right to statutory insurance at the lowest monthly rate, which is currently approx. 90 €.

If you become ill, please try to keep close to this description.

Steps you should take:

1. Phone a doctor (generalist), say what is wrong and make an appointment.
2. Keep the appointment and give your health insurance card to the secretary.
3. The generalist will examine you and in some cases send you to a special doctor.
4. If you get a prescription, you will have to go to a pharmacy. There you have to pay 5 - 10 € for the medicine, if your prescription is on a pink paper. If your prescription is on green paper, you need to pay the full price for the medicine.
5. In most cases you will get a bill from the doctor. Please ask him for further instructions: sometimes you are asked to pay it immediately, other times you are asked to contact your health insurance back home. They will tell you, if you have to pay the bill by yourself or if they will do it for you.

Please note that medicine can only be bought in pharmacies. Even medicine against headaches is not available in supermarkets. You will only find vitamins and herbal remedies there.

1.6 Transportation systems

You can travel through Germany by train, bus, car or airplane.

In Heilbronn there are a lot of buses which drive you to nearly every place in the city. There is also a city train (Stadtbahn) which takes you quickly and often to the towns around Heilbronn. There is a special offer for students: for 153 € you can use any public transportation in Heilbronn for the whole semester. It is called the "Semesterticket". For all of those students who have their residence directly in Heilbronn, it will be given for free for one semester.

If you want or need to travel **longer distances**, it would be wise to check out different possibilities. The trains of the Deutsche Bahn might not be the cheapest way of travelling. There are low-cost/budget airlines like Ryanair, Eurowings and Air Berlin to get to other places. Further information can be found in *5.2 Internet Guide*.

Since the beginning of 2013, there is also a wide offer for bus trips available, hosted by different companies. Those trips need to be booked in advance and they are a cheap possibility to visit different German and other European cities.

Travelling to Heilbronn

The nearest airport to Heilbronn is Stuttgart International Airport, located just about 1 hour from Heilbronn. The most common way to travel to Heilbronn from here is by train. It takes between 1h 20mins and 1h 40mins, and you must change trains once, usually at Stuttgart main station. It should cost about 16 €.

However, most **international flights** will arrive at Frankfurt International Airport, which is a large airport. In order to catch a train to Heilbronn you must go to the Fernbahnhof, located at the airport. From there trains can be taken to Heilbronn, you will need to change once, usually in Mannheim. It takes about 2 hours and will cost between 39 € and 43 €.

2. Heilbronn

2.1 The city of Heilbronn

Heilbronn is a city in northern Baden-Württemberg, Germany. It is completely surrounded by Heilbronn County and with approximately 120.000 residents it is the 6th largest city in Baden-Württemberg.



Heilbronn is the major economic center of the Heilbronn-Franken region, which includes almost the entire Northeast of Baden-Württemberg. Well-known companies such as Unilever and Audi are located nearby. Heilbronn is also known for its wine industry.



2.2 Geography

Heilbronn is located in the northern corner of the Neckar basin at the bottom of the Wartberg (308 m). It is spread out on both banks of the Neckar on a fertile terrace. The highest spot inside city limits is the Schweinsberg with a height of 372 m.

Heilbronn and its surroundings are located in the northern part of the larger Stuttgart metropolitan area.

As already mentioned, the city acts as the economic centre of the Heilbronn-Franken region and is one of 14 cities referred to as major economic centers in the Baden-Württemberg master plan of 2002.



3. Hochschule Heilbronn (HHN)

3.1 Heilbronn University

Heilbronn University ranks amongst the major institutions for Higher Education in the state of Baden-Württemberg. Founded in 1961 as a **School of Engineering**, it was awarded its current University status in 1971. It now caters for approximately 8.300 degree-seeking students. It is a vibrant and successful institution working closely with its many partners in business, industry and the local community to create a



sustainable, creative and ethical learning environment for its students. Its courses provide the graduates with a sound theoretical foundation, but also integrate work life oriented elements. These include work placements or project work, commissioned by business organisations.

Over the last two decades, Heilbronn University has become a regional leader in technology driven research and has established its own Institute of Applied Research. All offered courses can be found here:

Heilbronn University also has campuses in Künzelsau and Schwäbisch Hall:

Künzelsau is a small but bustling city about 60 km northeast of Heilbronn, situated on the river Kocher. This campus is named after its major benefactor, Reinhold Würth. It specialises in Electrical Engineering, Industrial Engineering, Culture, Leisure and Sports Management as well as Media, Product and Customer Management.

Schwäbisch Hall is the second largest city in the Heilbronn-Franken region and is also situated on the river Kocher, about 50 km east of Heilbronn. Due to its medieval flair and high working and living standards, it can be considered as a city where tradition and innovation merge in an excellent manner.

The most recent campus of Heilbronn University is located here and was opened in the winter semester 2009/10.

It specializes in Business Management and Sales and offers 3 different focuses: Financial Services, Trade and Industry. Further degree courses are scheduled.

3.2 Buildings

Campus Heilbronn – Sontheim

A lot of the lecture rooms are in the A-building. In the A-building you will also find the main entrance and the information desk. **The International Office is also situated in building A.** The cafeteria and canteen (in German: Mensa) and the registrar's offices are in building B. Building C and D house lecture rooms as well (but mostly for the technical subjects). On the ground floor of building E you'll find the library and in building F the computer pools, where you can also copy and print. The university's printers can be found in the cellar of building F. 3.4 Facilities

3.4.1 Library

The library of Campus Sontheim is situated on the ground floor of building E. During the first three weeks of the semester there are introductions every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at 1.30pm. If you borrow a book from the library, you'll usually have to give it back after three weeks. You get an email which informs you when to bring it back. You need your student identity card for borrowing.

The library is opened Monday to Friday from 9am to 8pm, Saturday from 9am to 5pm. The library on Campus Europaplatz can be found on the ground floor of building N room 030/031 (opening hours differ).

3.4.2 Campus Card

The Campus Card works like your credit card at the HHN. You'll need it to buy food and drinks. You can get it in the cafeteria for a deposit of 5 € (when you give the card back you'll get back the deposit and the amount of money which is left on the card).

There are two machines in the cafeteria to top up your card. To do so, you'll have to insert euro notes or your EC card. The machine doesn't take coins.

3.4.3 Cafeteria and Mensa (Canteen)

The cafeteria offers a variety of sandwiches, snacks, sweets and hot beverages. It is opened from Monday to Friday from 7.30am to 4pm. It is also a nice place to stay between the lectures. 3.4.8 Student identity card

After having presented all papers for enrolment at the International Office, you will be able to print your student card (plastic card) with a special printer which is located next to the “Studentisches Servicebüro” (room B026). This card is offering special prices in cinemas, museums and so on. Just ask for a student discount. Students based on the Campus Europaplatz will receive their Campuscard by the secretary of the registrar’s office.

It is also a transportation ticket for the city of Heilbronn after 7pm and on weekends in case you don’t have the Semesterticket.

3.4.9 Language courses

The course “German as a foreign language” is offered both in winter and summer semester. It takes place two times a week for 90 minutes and gives you 6 ECTS credits. To get these credits and passing the exam it is absolutely essential that you attend regularly. This course is free of charge.

3.4.10 Fees

As an exchange student from a partner university you only have to pay the contribution for the “Studierendenwerk Heidelberg”, which supports services like the cafeteria or the transportation ticket. It is 72.50 € per semester at the moment.

4. Around your studies

4.1 Arrival

When planning your arrival please bear in mind that it isn't wise to arrive on the weekend, because banks and offices are closed, even the transportation is more difficult. Shops mostly do not open at all on Sundays. You should also try not to have only banknotes in large denomination on you, because they may be difficult to change.

4.2 The first night

If you do not have any accommodation for the first night, you can go to a hotel or the youth hostel. Details of these can be obtained at the Tourist Information Centre.

The Youth Hostel offers a relatively cheap overnight accommodation with breakfast: About 25€ (first night) - about 22€ (each further night). 4.3 Accommodation

Usually most exchange students are accommodated in the hall of residence (StuWo), provided by the Studierendenwerk Heidelberg. The monthly rent is 297€ – 315€ there. If you wish to stay anywhere else, there are lots of offers in the *Studentisches Servicebüro*. Usually the rent for a room close to the university is about 300 – 500€. As a rule, apart from the first month's rent, you have to pay between one and three-month rents as a security deposit before you move in.

4.4 Bank account

As a non-EU citizen, if you are studying in Germany it is **absolutely necessary** to have a German current bank account and also a blocked bank account, which will prove your financial situation. Most banks offer a **free current bank account for students**. You will also get a bank card. With this card you can take money from the cash machines and pay. For paying you need your PIN number or a signature. Sometimes small shops do not accept paying via card or you need to purchase more than a certain amount e.g. over 10 €. So it is necessary to always have some cash in your wallet.

4.5 Public transportation

From the StuWo you take the bus no. 61, 62, 63, 64 or 5 (direction train station, or Allee). You can also walk into the city centre within 15 minutes. Riding by bike is also a nice possibility. With your student identity card you can take the busses after 7pm and on the weekends for free. But you can also buy a Semesterticket, which allows you to take all the buses in the Heilbronn area.

4.6 Daily Shopping

Everything you need is around the StuWo (residence halls). If you go down Kreuzäckerstraße, you will find a drugstore shop (DM) on the left and on the right there is a Lidl (groceries). There is also another supermarket (EDEKA) at cross road of Kreuzäckerstraße.

A pharmacy and a grocery store (Netto) can be found at Jörg-Ratgeb-Platz.

You'll find a price list for several items in the appendix.
